



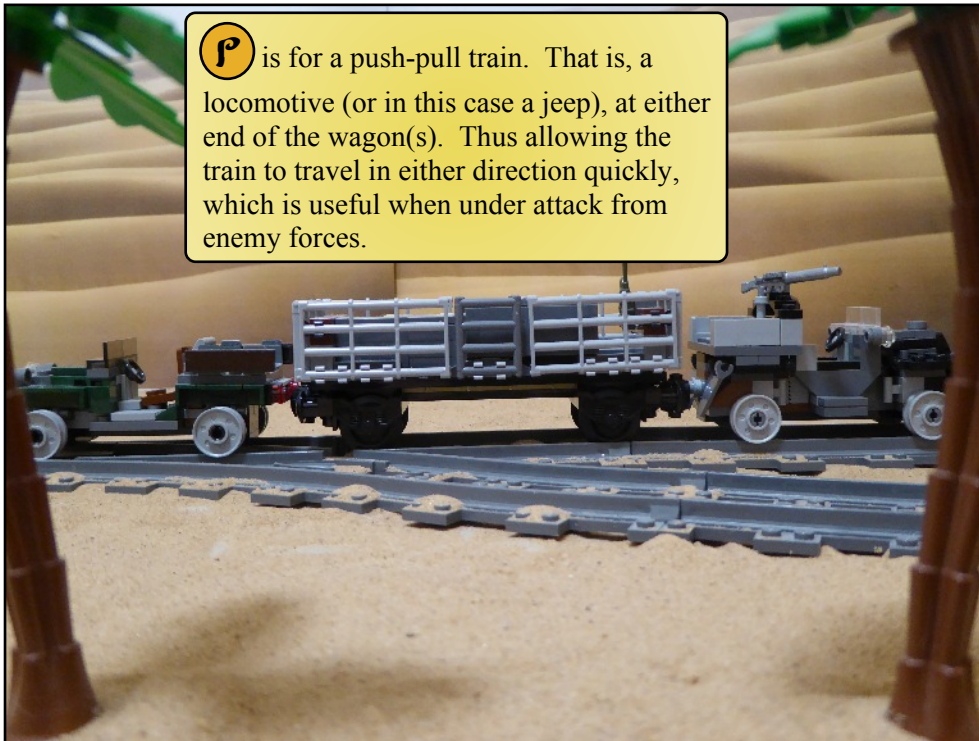
is for night in the desert. By day high temperatures, by night freezing temperatures.
